Mr. Hollman commented on five (5) days of school.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Dr. Steve Matthews, Superintendent of Schools, reminded the Board that there was a closed session this evening for the purpose of a possible purchase or lease of a property. He reported that today is November 5^{th} and is the ninth week of school. Dr. Matthews stated that when we started on September 8^{th} , we were unsure what the year would bring, but was confident that our staff, teachers, administrators, bus drivers, food service workers, secretaries, tech staff, and child care staff would find ways to connect with our students and continue providing a high quality educational experience for our students. He said that he was not disappointed.

Dr. Matthews mentioned that there have been missteps, mistakes, and struggles along the way, but our staff has been wonderful. He reported that they have been tested, but have found ways to make connections and have learned new skills, tried new experiences for both themselves and their students. Dr. Matthews stated that we continue to make progress on providing a high quality experience. He asked, can we do better? Certainly, but he is proud of our staff. Dr. Matthews said that he has seen them teach and heard their stories and this unpredictable and unusual year continues. He mentioned that we continue to learn.

Dr. Matthews reported that on November 19, we will again discuss our Return to School Plan that we are required by law to bring to the Board, and ask the Board to help us think through and think about where we should head.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORTS

Mr. McIntyre, Assistant Superintendent of Business and Operations, reported that the business office is revising the 2021 budget. He stated that they will be presenting it to the Board at a December Board Meeting.

Dr. RJ Webber, Assistant Superintendent for Academic Services, said that one of his favorite quotes is "you do not have to be sick to get better," author, Michael Josephson. He reported that after the last Board meeting, he got the impression from many of our teachers and administrators that what they are doing was failing the hybrid model. Dr. Webber contended that having the pleasure of being six buildings, in their classrooms and seeing them that it is quite far from the truth.

Dr. Webber complimented and expressed his gratitude to the Novi Community Coalition for providing 650 copies of *The Deepest Well*, which was read by the Novi Mental Health Alliance. He stated that there was a three-part book study on this book, which is about childhood trauma and how do we attend to it. Dr. Webber said that in light of what I going on in the pandemic, it is critically important.

He performed a show and tell with a couple of the fifth grade science kits to give parents an idea of what

our hybrid and virtual students are getting. Dr. Webber reported that these kits help the students to have a better understanding of science and a hands on experience. He stated that from a K-12 educational standpoint, our students have that opportunity. Dr. Webber said that he checked his Twitter handle and observed a fifth grade classroom where students were making predictions on what was going to happen. He thanked the Board for the commitment six years ago that made this funding possible. Dr. Webber reported that our K-12 science program is on of the very best in the state.

He thanked and complimented the Board on the decision that was made on August 6, to have the two (2) modalities launched. Dr. Webber expressed his appreciation to Dr. Matthews for being the COVID data "hound" that played hugely on what our District is doing.

BOARD COMMUNICATION

Mrs. Murphy, Board Trustee, piggybacked on what Dr. Webber mentioned around *The Deepest Well*, book discussion. She stated that it was a huge testament to the diversity of staff who were interested. Mrs. Murphy reported that we had a bus driver who participated and wanted to better understand how to help students. She stated that this was a fantastic group of people who participated. Mrs. Murphy expressed her gratitude to the coalition for the books and to Dr. Webber.

Mrs. Hood, Board Treasurer, reported that last night she attended the Oakland Schools Government Relations Committee meeting. She stated that she is the Board liaison to that committee. Mrs. Hood said there were a couple of things on the agenda; the elections results, finalizing Ellen Lipton as the new member of the State Board of Education. She mentioned that Ms. Lipton was a former House member from Huntington Woods and is a public education ally and advocate, which is good for all kids in Michigan. Mrs. Hood reported that Kelly Breen has replaced Kathy Crawford as the new Michigan House Representative. She stated that Ms. Breen has been on the Novi City Council for the past few years. Mrs. Hood said that there was a lot of turnover in some districts for Board members. She congratulated the three (3), Mr. Cook, Dr. Ruskin, and Mr. Mena, who were re-elected.

Mrs. Hood mentioned that they had a long discussion on COVID and schools that decided to come back full time. She reported that they are now coming back virtual and/or hybrid. Mrs. Hood reported that there are several, based on the newest Michigan cases being up, that are delaying this. These districts (Berkley, Walled Lake) are receiving more comments from their parents who are very concerned about their kids being in any school. She stated that these conversations are taking place all over Oakland County.

Mr. Mena, Board Secretary, reported that tomorrow morning he was heading out to watch our cross country runner compete in states. He stated that this should be pretty exciting. Mr. Mena said that the KLAA West Conference is the best division in the entire State of Michigan and is a very competitive division. He mentioned that the big football game is tomorrow against Detroit Catholic Central. Mr. Mena reported that we have played them five (5) or six (6) times and have not fared well, but our time is coming.

He piggybacked on what Dr. Webber mentioned and wanted to be clear that the folks he has spoken with do not feel our teachers are failing. Mr. Mena stated that they are just concerned about the implementation of the hybrid model. He said that he knows our administration has promised to make some improvement in hybrid. Mr. Mena mentioned that he would take some time between this meeting and the next to talk to some stakeholders and get a feeling of how things are really going. He reported that the comments came from the teachers themselves, so he would be talking to some teachers. Mr. Mena stated that if he finds it worthwhile, he will share his findings.

Mr. Cook, Board Trustee, said to follow what Mr. Mena said regarding the return to school plan, the Board will be voting next week and the tutoring, some common activities for K-6, one of the things he asked for was making sure we are driving those combo classes down to option one. He stated that he would like to see how that is going. Mr. Cook reported that his company is partnering with Sylvan Learning Centers for parents to get tutors with free drop in, at certain times. He asked how our tutoring, that we started, was going. Mr. Cook stated that the work needs to get out. He said that it is not that the teachers are not doing their job, it is the kids need to be engaged when they are at home and it falls on the parents. Mr. Cook mentioned those are the areas he was hoping to see some improvement.

Mrs. Roney, Board Trustee, congratulated a Novi Cross Country runner, Elizabeth Babcock for being named the Heisman High School Scholarship winner for the state of Michigan. She also gave big kudos to our teachers, who have been working hard. Mrs. Roney reported that we are working hard to find a solution that makes parents and staff happy. She stated just give us some time.

Dr. Ruskin, Board President, reported that Volleyball District finals were tonight and they won, so they are off to regionals. She stated there is a big football game tomorrow and it would be very exciting to have our guys move on from Brighton. Mr. Smith said that every day our kids get to participate in athletics or extracurricular, based on what we see happening throughout the county and as things progress, people are pulling the plug on these kids. She mentioned that every morning she is excited when she sees that they can continue to do these things in a safe manner, so good luck teams that are still playing in the playoffs, representing Novi. Dr. Ruskin reported that is what it is all about, having our kids engaged with education being the priority, but having socialization. She stated that we are holding steady and there is always work to be done.

TOPIC: Return to School Planning: Considerations for shifting school modes

On March 12, 2020, Governor Whitmer temporarily suspended K-12 instruction and encouraged schools to provide the best alternative means of instruction.

On April 1, 2020, the Governor closed schools for the rest of the 2019-2020 school year and required schools to develop a Continuity of Learning Plan.

On June 30, 2020, Governor Whitmer published her Return to School Roadmap and Executive Order 2020-142 was issued to guide schools as they prepared for fall 2020 return to school.

On July 7, 2020, the Novi Community School District published its ROAR (Responsive Organizational and Academic Return) Plan. This plan was in response to the requirements of Executive Order 2020-142.

On July 16 and July 30, the Novi Community School District Board of Education discussed Return to School planning and preparation.

On August 6, 2020, the Board approved a Return to School recommendation. The recommendation stated:

That the Novi community School District Board of Education approve the following options for our fall 2020 return to school:

- In-person: A hybrid blend of in-person and virtual instruction with strict adherence to clear safety protocols. The board directs the administration in concert with the teachers to identify the best possible hybrid option.
- Virtual online instruction: An online, virtual learning program for students
- The Board of Education commits to these options through November 6, 2020.

After the August 6 vote, parents were sent a commitment form for the start of the school year.

After commitments were made, our administrative staff spent hours planning and preparing for the upcoming school year. Schedules were created trying to balance hybrid and virtual class loads, class requests at the middle and high school, and the needs of students and staff.

School started on September 8. Approximately 55% of parents chose the virtual option and 45% of parents chose the hybrid option.

On August 20, 2020, Public Act 149 was signed into law that required an Extended COVID-19 Learning Plan. The Novi Community School District Board of Education approved the extended learning plan on September 24, 2020.

The Extended COVID-19 Learning Plan requires that the Board of Education each month reconfirm how instruction is going to be delivered during the 2020-2021 school year.

On September 24, 2020, the board approved the Extended COVID-19 Learning Plan.

On October 15, 2020, the Board voted again and extended the current hybrid/virtual learning plan until at least January 22, 2021.

Tonight the following will be reviewed with the Board of Education:

- COVID-19 numbers as required by law
- Continued improvements made since October 15

The Board will once again be asked to identify how instruction will be given.

RECOMMENDATION: That the Novi Community School District Board of Education,

In order to provide certainty for our students, parents, and teachers, the Novi Community School District Board of Education reconfirm the following options:

Recommendation One

- Through at least January 22, 2021, the end of the first semester:
 - In-person: A hybrid blend of in-person and virtual instruction with strict adherence to clear safety protocols. Students will attend inperson school two days a week, virtual experience on Wednesday, and be provided at-home experiences two days a week.
 - Virtual online instruction: An online, virtual learning program for students.
 - Continued focus on improving both our hybrid and our virtual programming.

Recommendation Two

If, because of quarantine, classrooms cannot be appropriately staffed individual classrooms or individual schools could go virtual until appropriate staffing levels can be maintained. Without our teachers, the human capital, schools cannot operate effectively.

Recommendation Three

Parents will be asked again to recommit for second semester by December 4 to either virtual or hybrid in-person learning for second semester beginning January 25.

The hybrid in-person plan would continue as two days in-person, two at-home days, and one all virtual day until the county moved into Level B of the Oakland County Health Division Guidance for In-person Instruction Scale.

When the county moves to Level B on the Oakland County Health Division Guidance for In-person Instruction Scale, the hybrid would become a 5 day a week experience for students.

Hybrid students would stay hybrid for the entire second semester.

Virtual students would stay virtual for the entire second semester.

Any changes in plan to second semester will potentially result in changes in teachers or schedules for all students. We will work to avoid changes as much as possible but it is inevitable that changes in both teacher and schedules will occur for some students.

Recommendation Four

We will examine the district from a preschool special education, K-6 and 7-12, NATC lens. Decisions may differ for these groups based on the risk level, the difficulty of creating changes, and the opportunities presented by our physical facilities.

The Extended COVID-19 Return to School Plan will be reviewed again in December.

New requirements

- August 20, 2020, Governor Whitmer signed PA 149 which required an Extended COVID-19 Learning Plan

 - Required to reconfirm every calendar month

Board Action: Return to School

TOPIC: Land Purchase

The 2019 Bond approved by the voters of the Novi Community School District identified a variety of projects throughout the district that would improve opportunities and educational experiences for our students. One project was to reconfigure the Novi Meadows building and create a new configuration for Meadows 5/6 students. This plan would redesign the 5/6 building using a significant portion of the 5th grade house. This would also create opportunities to repurpose the 6th grade house for other programs.

This project will require that two programs relocate for up to two full academic years. Novi Career Prep/Alternative Education/Adult Education and the Novi Adult Transition Center will need to find temporary quarters for the 2021/22 and the 2022/23 academic years.

Instead of renting space, an opportunity to buy the Walsh College – Novi campus has become a possibility. This campus could house these two programs for the 2021/2022 and 2022/2023 academic years, provide potential COVID relief space, and offer opportunities to expand virtual learning.

During the next two years, the property could also begin to be repurposed as the permanent home for these programs or for other district purposes. Repurposing this property could be done for much less than building new.

A purchase agreement with a refundable deposit is being proposed that would allow the district to review possibilities for 60 days. Before the 60-day window closes the district would need to decide whether to move forward with the purchase or cancel the agreement and receive the deposit back in full.

If the decision would take longer than the 60-day refundable deposit window, the district could extend the time with a minimal non-refundable deposit.

This comes to the Board this evening after being discussed in closed session. Discussing purchasing real property is an acceptable use of closed session under the Open Meetings Act.

The administration recommends approving this purchase agreement and moving forward with a 60-day review of the Walsh college – Novi campus. This review would include a thorough vetting of the building, an examination of funding options, and a clear vision of how the building could support programming in the Novi Community School District both in the immediate future and for long-term growth.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: That the Novi Community School District Board of Education approve the purchase agreement for the Walsh College – Novi Campus building and land.

The current textbook for this curriculum is fifteen years old. After reviewing four (4) different textbooks, Ms. Ebel would like to introduce *The Comprehensive Health Skills* textbook, by Catherine A. Sanderson, PhD and Mark Zelman, PhD.

This book is based on national standards, which align with the Michigan standards that we currently us in Novi and it ties closest to our learning targets that we use in Health class. This is a required credit course for graduation. It helps make learning meaningful with up to date research points and statistics and, because of the layout, can be used as a quick reference guide as well.

I. Proposal

The <u>Comprehensive Health Textbook -G-W Publisher</u> is proposed for the <u>Health</u> class(es) for the 2021-2022 academic year.

The current curriculum was developed in 2007 and adopted for classes when the new state standards were implemented in 2007. Therefore the curriculum that is currently being presented to students is almost 13 years old.

IV. Staff Development Needs

There are no staff development needs for supportive implementation of adopting a new textbook.

V. Review Process and Evaluation

The process of determining an appropriate textbook for the Reproductive Health Curriculum began in the fall of 2016. I obtained several textbooks from publishers to review. After receiving the textbooks from the various publishers, I compared 4 comprehensive text books with Chandra Madafferi to determine the best fit for Novi Community Schools health program. The book that fit best was G-W Publishing, Comprehensive Health.

In addition to the recommended textbook, the textbooks I reviewed were:

Glencoe Health, Pearson Health and Lifetime Health We also reviewed the Michigan Model curriculum which we felt works better as a filler, not a replacement for a textbook.

After reviewing the textbooks and receiving recommendations, I have decided to recommend: G-W Publishers Comprehensive Health
